TODAY I CAN summarise the unit with a language map, an oral explanation and five connected sentences.



The cards become one map.

A gust of wind scatters Nia's cards. She and Pip collect every clue from the unit.

Their map connects PLACE, PERSON, VOICE, MEANING and QUESTION.

The map shows where English travels, who carries it and how careful listeners make meaning.

Nia places the cards in a circle. No single voice stands at the centre, and Swedish remains a useful planning bridge.

MEANING

Add one clue to the map.

QUESTION

Add one clue to the map.
